- 4. Choose whatever opposing point of view/rebuttal combination you think is the best and find a place in your essay in either the introduction or conclusion to include it.
- 5. Check to make sure your paragraph still flows well. If not, feel free to ask a classmate or teacher for help.
- 6. Congratulations! You now have a perfect example of a persuasive essay that you are (hopefully) very proud of!
